- 1. One-hundred-thirteen-year-old University launches first ever statewide awareness campaign with A Tradition of Different; includes new look to bring new focus to the university and relevance of liberal arts today.
 - New campaign distinguishes Science & Arts' role among other Oklahoma's higher education institutions and importance of having a strong public liberal arts university in the state of Oklahoma
 - New logo and its significance
 - New name: the university will now refer to itself as Science & Arts

2. A growing number of would-be undergraduates are opting out of college after the pandemic accelerated the problem of affordability amid rising college costs nationwide.

- Science & Arts offers a more affordable option compared to other state schools, coming in \$1,000-\$3,000 less a semester (Source: <u>collegetutioncompare.com</u>)
- Science & Arts is ranked #7 on the 100 Most Affordable Small Colleges West of the Mississippi list
 - 92% of Science & Arts' students receive some type of financial aid.
 - Fewer kids are going to college because they say it costs too much, 3/14/21
 - A recent survey of high school students found the likelihood of attending a four-year school sank nearly 20% in last eight months — down to 53%, from 71%, according to ECMC Group, a nonprofit aimed at helping student borrowers.
 - A majority of students and parents now say affordability and dealing with the <u>debt burden</u> that goes with a degree is their top concern, according to The Princeton Review's <u>2021 College Hopes & Worries survey</u>.
 - For college-bound students and their parents, a whopping 98% of families said <u>financial aid</u> would be necessary to pay for college and 82% said it was "extremely" or "very" necessary, The Princeton Review found.

3. Families are questioning the return on their college investment.

 - A liberal arts education is intended to expand the capacity of the mind to think critically and analyze information effectively.
